

2017 Fruit Trees



Peaches \$24.99/5 gal

Early Elberta ripens early July. Small freestone pit with thick juicy fruit. Compact tree. Self-fruitful but a nearby pollinizer will increase production.

Belle of Georgia ripens mid-July. Freestone with white flesh. Peaches are very large, firm and sweet.

Redskin ripens mid-July. Freestone fruit with yellow meat.

Junegold ripens in May. Low chill hours. Clingstone, good size yellow flesh.

Sam Houston ripens June. Low chill hours. Yellow freestone peach. Because Sam Houston trees have especially showy flowers, it makes a wonderful edible landscaping tree.

Pears \$24.99/5 gal

Kieffer pears ripen between September and October. Kieffer trees are hardy and robust. Kieffer's produce large, hard pears good for cooking. Kieffer's need a pollinator.

Orient pears ripen in August. They produce large golden skinned fruit. Trees are blight resistant. Orient pears need a pollinator.

20th Century Asian pears produce sweet, white fleshed pears that ripen in late August. Self-fruitful.

Apples \$24.99/5 gal

Gala apples are usually ready in September. Apples are crisp and sweet-tart, good for both eating and cooking. Pollinator needed.

Granny Smith apples ripen late in August. Apples are large, tart, bright yellow to green. Pollinator needed.

Anna apples are a good choice for Texas because they need lower numbers of chill hours to produce fruit. Anna apples ripen in late June. Anna apples are tart when first ripe but will sweeten soon after they are fully ripened. Pollinator needed.

Plums \$24.99/5 gal

Santa Rosa plums ripen in June producing large purplish, amber fleshed fruit. Self pollinator.

Methley plums ripen in late May. Plums are large and red, and have golden flesh. Self pollinator.

Bruce plums are an early ripening tree. Sweet flavored fruit. Self pollinator.

Figs \$24.99/5 gal

Black Mission figs are especially sweet with purplish-black fruit.

Celeste figs are brownish rose in color and have a smooth rich flavor.

Texas Everbearing trees are extremely hardy in our area. They produce medium brownish-purple fruit that are very sweet.

Persimmons \$29.99/5 gal

Fuyu persimmons produce medium-sized, firm deep-orange fruit with a sweet taste. Trees have lovely drooping branches and are heat-tolerant. Self pollinator.

Pecans \$59.99/6 gal

Choctaw pecans have a high oil content, thin hull and large shape.

Desirable pecans are another large pecan with a thin shell. They produce early and usually are heavy bearers.

Blueberries \$8.99/1 gal

Austin berries ripen in June. Traditionally a good producer, Austin berries are medium to large in size. Pollinator needed.

Climax berries ripen in late May to Early June. Climax berries are small to medium in size. Pollinator needed.

Grapes \$12.99/1 gal

Thompson Seedless grapes are vigorous growers in fertile soil. The vine is sensitive to cold and should be cane pruned for best results. Produces a green grape in long clusters of small berries.

Red Flame (seedless) grapes can also be sensitive to the cold. Red Flame grapes is a good producer of table-quality grapes.

Blackberries \$8.99/1 gal

Apache (thornless) canes grow rapidly and produce large sweet berries.

Arapahoe (thornless) canes are very productive, producing medium-sized firm berries.
